Steven Alcus Threefoot – 60, of Arden passed away on Feb 18. Steven was born in New Orleans. He obtained degrees from Northwestern University (BS Biomedical Eng), Tulane University (MS Chem Eng), and University of DE (PhD Chemical Eng). He shared his knowledge of project leadership and quality as an instructor, mentor, and leader of students and projects globally across DuPont and as an adjunct professor in Chemical Engineering at U of D for 25 years. **6.0 Visitors – Councilman John Cartier, NCC District 8**

John presented the Town Chair with: Code Enforcement Report for the period December 2016 to March 2017 (5 cases and 4 of those cases resolved) and Crime Report for the period January 2017 to March 2017. (Received 18 calls for service; couple burglaries, 1 criminal mischief)

John supports purchase of land and he promises that he will do his best to lobby with New Castle County Government to assist financially if the Village decides to go ahead with acquisition of this land. New Castle County has Capital budget for Fiscal Year 2017 that has land acquisition funds in it. This would be a very modest request.

Tomorrow night is the FY 2018 Budget address by our newly elected Town Executive, Matt Meyers. Matt Meyer has deep roots in Brandywine One Hundred. Not only will it lay out the budget but it will prioritize governing of the next year areas of focus. County Executive Meyers has put together strong team to govern this county. **7.0 Towns Chair’s Communication Report - Chair Jeffrey Politis**

Communications from the Chair.

Since the last town meeting....

The last several months have been quiet, but there are a few notable things that have gone on.

1. Today is election day for the Village. I wanted to both thank those who have casted or will cast their ballot as well as those willing to serve on a committee of the Village. It is through the service of our committee members that allow the Village to run. Thank you.
2. We have received the paperwork for mosquito control from DNREC. As we have agreed to spraying in recent years, I have signed and returned the agreement. Note that spraying for mosquitos does not automatically happen, but rather a request must be made to mosquito control from the Village.
3. We have received a complaint regarding FOIA. The complaint, made to the Department of Justice, concerned the Town Chair's participation in helping to coordinate FOIA responses. Although the DOJ determined that it was not their say as to who acted as FOIA coordinator, they did find the Village was out of compliance in that we did not clearly indicate who the Village's FOIA coordinator is. We have added this information to the Village website. Our FOIA coordinator is the Village Secretary.
4. We received a letter from the attorney for Ms. Carol DiGiovanni expressing concern about the governance or the Village, specifically as it concerns the town chair's action in facilitating the advisory meeting on March 6. The specific concern was that I had "decided to assumed the advisory chair" even though I was not elected to the position. I have referred this matter to our attorney who will respond if he deems necessary. As a new advisory chair will be elected this evening, I would hope this concern is resolved.

**2017 Application for Senior School Tax Rebate:**

The Senior School Tax Rebate is available to if you are over 65 or will be turning 65 by July 1<sup>st</sup> of the year you apply.

The rebate will appear on a leaseholder's New Castle County School Tax bill, which is sent to the Trustees for payment. The Trustees rebate the amount that reduces the tax bill to the leaseholder. This can be up to a \$500 rebate annually.

New Castle County has other programs that may reduce a leaseholder's County and School property taxes based upon low income and/or disability. Any such reductions in a leaseholder's tax bill will also be rebated directly to the leaseholder.

You may apply for the rebates by calling New Castle County at 302-395-5520. The county personnel will walk you through the process.

Make sure you apply in a timely fashion to ensure that your paperwork is received before the deadline of April 30th so that your exemption can be approved and processed for the current tax year.

**12.0 Forest Committee and Community Planning Committee’s Joint Motion Proposing Arden to Purchase Property at 5 Mill Race Road.**

Introduction

Community Planning and the Forest Committees [Carol Larson] have been working together with Jeff Politis, Town Chair, regarding parcel #0604500085 located at 5 Mill Race Road in Highland Woods.

This property boards our Arden Forest and over the past few months Jeff has been negotiating with the land owner about his interest in selling this land.

With this in mind let me outline what we will present:

1. Want to provide a brief background on this opportunity and why we are before you for approval.
2. Carol Larson will provide the environmental effect this parcel has to our Arden forest, especially if building occurs.
3. I will ask Jeff as chair to open the floor for questions.
4. I will place before you the motion for approval.

### Background

This is an opportunity to preserve and care for the Arden forest land that we have cherished since Arden's inception. This parcel is located at 5 Mill Race Road in Highland Woods, it is 1.6 acres with 4 building lots. Two of these lots are buildable, the other two are in the water shield and would be difficult to develop. The owner has already received several offers from people who want to build. At our last meeting in January Town Assembly unanimously approved our chairman to move ahead with negotiations for the purpose of exploring the opportunity to acquire this parcel. We now have an understanding of how this could be achieved. But before I move ahead with a motion it is important for all of us to understand the interdependency of this parcel to our Arden forest.

It is our intension not to add cost to our leasehold in the form of a mortgage and for us to designate the parcel as "public land" which would exempt it from taxes. It is also our intension to seek matching funding and any and all other resources from the state and county that we can obtain to offset the cost. With this in mind we will propose that we use a portion of the Schroeder/Pendulum fund to as our funding source to acquire this parcel.

Secondly, I want to raise the issue that there is a timing factor. The current owner is willing to work with us but he will not wait long. So, it is important that this issue be addressed today.

Carol Larson provided Ecological background: She showed a map of the parcel positioned along the creek and surveys of the parcel showing area outside of the floodplain and plans for building on the lot. 5 Mill Race is a critical natural area designated by New Castle County but because the lot is platted it is buildable. It is rare to find undeveloped land in New Castle County. The parcel is vulnerable to

construction. No foundation nor driveway has been dug and that will make it easier to restore. They believe it is appropriate to use the Schroeder funds because the will states that the funds should be used “For the preservation and care of the natural areas”.

The parcel is valuable to Arden because of all of its benefits that go along with having a natural area: wooded land can control flooding because plant life slows down water, native plants filter nutrients and pollutants, and roots slow erosion and damage to the creek from excess sediment. Larger natural area can support bigger animals like foxes and owls. Shading the creek controls temperature which is important to creek entomology.

Price Comparison per acre: \$62.5K (Mill Race Rd), \$170K. (Avery Annex) and \$170K (2409 Woodland).

Read Original **Motion** so people have a sense of what they are voting for:

It is moved that the Village of Arden purchase land at 5 Mill Race Road, Highland Woods parcel #0604500085 for public use as part of the Arden Forest and obtain up to \$110,000 from the Schroeder/Pendulum fund as the source to acquire this land.

#### Jeff provided clarification of Pendulum Fund Process

Jeff explained that there is a process of using the Pendulum Fund. This would be outside of that process. As the process is approved at Town Assembly, this body has the ability to approve any changes or exceptions. By approval of this motion, we are also approving an exception to that process. In essence, the way it is requested, and the amount of money for process. This is significantly larger than what we normally would request from the Pendulum Fund.

#### **Discussion/Questions for clarity of Motion**

Q Warren Rosenkranz - Is against motion - because he believes the Johanna’s will states the funds are to be used in the Village of Arden and this leasehold is located outside of the Village.

A Ray - In the strict view that might make sense. We are looking at that as part of the will because it is virtually impossible to distinguish the effect that this parcel will have on the current Arden Forest. They

are so interdependent that they are one. For example, it is like saying you are going to stop the air from going over.

Q Brooke Bovard - In favor of motion – She wants to make sure the land will not be developed.

A Ray - The motion says “designate as public land” that is the designation. Jeff will be working with Councilman Cartier to fulfill the application process to turn it into public land. Brooke – motion reads “public use” should it be public land. Ray says no the motion has correct term.

Q Ed Rohrbach - In favor of motion - because there is a little spring that runs through that parcel that is a desirable nursery area for amphibians and small fish. It would be destroyed if they developing it and that would be a shame. Ed believes that alone makes it valuable enough to acquire it.

Q Jeff Steen – In favor of motion - What money is going to be spent to acquire this property?

A Jeff Politis – The motion is to use up to \$110,000 from Pendulum Fund. Time frame is from tonight’s vote to closing date of June 30 to allow time to seek grants and other monies to come in. If town Assembly approves it, and has financial backing, owner is willing to work with Village to give them time to seek additional funding. Jeff Steen – clarification - If these other funds fall by the way side, the town by affirming to purchase this parcel could be affirming to find all funding within Pendulum Fund. Correct.

Q Carol DiGiovanni – Wanted to know if this motion was posted to the Village website?

A No

Q Carol - Was an appraisal obtained from a qualified appraiser?

A Jeff – No written appraisal was obtained because a land appraisal starts at \$2,500. Based on copies of the written offers made to the land owner in the amount of \$95,000 and \$120,000 respectively, they were comfortable that the value of the land was within the scope and that this was for the Town Assembly to decide.

Q Carol -How much is currently in the Pendulum Fund?

A David Mickelson - \$413,000.

Q Carol - Has anyone received in writing from the county or the state matching funds?

A No, that is what is being currently perused.

Carol -So, you are asking for us to vote on a motion that you have no idea where other funds may be coming from? Ray reiterated the motion that addressed funds and reiterated what he said earlier in the discussion about funding sources. Jeff asked Carol to hold her other questions so those in line can have a chance to voice their opinions.

Q Walter Borders - Who would be on title of the land?

A Village of Arden.

Q Lynda Kolski – What is the purchase price?

A \$100,000 for all four lots on 1.6 acres and the additional monies for closing costs and potential removal of some rocks.

Sharon Simmons -Wants to make sure that the plan is to remove the rock that is on the property. Yes

Marianne Cinaglia – Motion states “public use” and Marianne thinks this is too broad. She suggests to switch it out with “remains undeveloped”.

Jennifer Borders -She supports the motion and loves the idea of a natural respite instead of intrusive housing. Especially preserving it for the future.

Q Carol DiGiovanni – Wanted to know what the restrictions of Johanna’s will were that Jeff referred to in the article he placed in the Arden Page to announce there will be a motion at the next Town Assembly as well as providing some background about the motion.

A Jeff – Explained that Johanna’s will had put some requirements on how the money was to be spent. He provided in the Arden Page the web link address to Johanna’s Wills so you could read it to understand the terms. She wanted something more specific? Ray -The will “preservation and care of the natural space within the Village of Arden”. Carol believes “within the Village” does not mean the

land that they want to acquire which is adjacent to Arden forest. Jeff said that the Town Assembly tonight will determine the interpretation of the will. Carol disagrees.

Tom Wheeler – He is speaking to the motion and he wanted to remind everyone that he was the executive of her estate. He was the only one who spoke to Johann regarding her desire to leave something that was memorable and to preserve something that she loved. As Tom said “In his humble opinion, this is the first express use of the money that is actually appropriate”. We also purchased Avery property which was not a part of Arden and now it is. Thank Goodness! Applause.

Ruth Panella – She does not think any preposition negate what Johanna’s will says “the health and survival of the woods and greens”. Applause.

**Amended Motion**

It is moved that the Village of Arden purchase land at 5 Mill Race Road, Highland Woods parcel #0604500085 for public use to remain as undeveloped natural woodlands as part of the Arden Forest, and obtain up to \$110,000 from the Schroeder/Pendulum fund as the source to acquire this land.

Cecilia - Speaks to the Motion

Within the intent of Johannes intent. Many environmental benefits. It’s a buffer. Time is of the essence and he encourages to move forward on motion. No financial burden will accrue to us. It is a gift to the Village. No expense from any one individual. From his perspective, he thinks this is a home run. Applause.

Randy Hoopes – Speaks to the Motion

He believes that several are correct when they point out specific desire that the proceeds of the estate to be used for “preservation and care of natural spaces within the Village of Arden”. That is in the will.

However, others have said the woods and streams have been their joy and inspiration and I wish to contribute to their health and survival in the years to come. He believes the motion speaks to the second statement. Since there is no Arden Supreme Court to decide, this is it. It is a little bit of interpretation but ultimately, he supports the motion as written. Applause.

BWVC Committee Report to the March 2017 Village of Arden Town Meeting

The Buzz Ware committee has a number of items to cover this evening. We will cover

Community Programs: As a reminder, the Buzz sponsors a number of classes (i.e., Strength & Mobility twice a week and a Yoga class on Saturday morning), regular programs (i.e., Coffeehouse, Art on the Town, the Georgist Group, Monday night art class), and other special events. Interest and financial support for these programs continues to be strong.

If you have an idea for a special event or would like to organize an ongoing program, please go to our website – [www.ardenbuzz.com](http://www.ardenbuzz.com) – and submit a “Community Event” request form.

We have received for consideration events that seemed ideal to be Community Events except for the ability of the event to be publicized. Our position is that the event must be submitted with enough time for the committee to discuss it and if accepted to be published in the Arden Page. Unlike Facebook, the Arden Page reaches every mail box. A poorly publicized event is really a private event. Please give your event enough time to be considered and publicized when you submit your request.

Repairs and Maintenance: The building has a continuing problem of roof leaks over the stage. It appeared that for a time the problem was fixed. It is clearly not fixed. We are actively engaged to fix this problem. We also had major sewer line blockages that interrupted room rentals. The details are not yet known as to how the building’s sewer line ties to the county line. Using plumber’s tools the line appears to leave the building at the back bathroom, crosses under the basketball court and then somehow ties into the county line along The Highway. Unplugging the line, discounted, was over \$1000. The building does not have an outdoor cleanout. Current building code and general maintenance requires one. We think it is prudent to research the plumbing toward preventing other plumbing problems.

Financial: As of March 23rd, the Buzz Ware’s operating budget is negative by approximately \$2,283. We would like to be revenue neutral. However, we brought in 20% fewer rental dollars than 2016. We will be studying the situation, looking to improve the number of rentals. If you know of anyone looking for a unique place to hold a private party, a workshop, or a special event, please let them know about The Buzz. The renovation fund now has approximately \$541.00.

Peddlers, Potions and Practitioners Holistic Market Place:

Planning has already begun for our 12th annual Peddlers, Potions and Practitioners Holistic Market Place at the Arden Fair. This is our one and only fundraiser. Last year was our most successful to date, raising \$6,937. All the income collected goes directly into our Buzz Ware Village Center renovation fund. If you or someone you know is interested in vending on September 2<sup>nd</sup>, please contact Toby Ridings, our vendor relation’s coordinator. If you are interested in volunteering to help stage the event

please contact Randy Hoopes, our volunteer coordinator. The Planning Committee is forming now.

In cooperation, the Forest and Civic Committees were awarded a Tree Management grant from the Urban and Community Forestry Program, Delaware Forest Service for \$1680.

In partnership with the New Castle County Conservation District, we applied for a Community Water Quality Improvement Grant to implement our plans from ForeSite Associates to restore the area in Sherwood Forest damaged by runoff from Buckingham Greene. ### Notes to March 2017 3YR Expense Projections 2018-2019

**Overall-** For the column headed 2017-2018, the amounts are those approved in the budget referenda for that year and are not actual expenditures. The remaining columns contain forecast amounts.

#### Note 1- School & County Taxes

The 2018-2019 county and school tax are expected to increase nominally. The budgeted numbers for 2018-2019 and beyond represent a 3% increase year over year of the 2017-2018 budgeted number for property taxes.

**Note 2-** Trustees administration costs are not expected to vary greatly from their YE 2017 levels. A 3% increase in the total trustee administration is predicted for 2018-2019 and beyond.

**Note 3-** Trash pickup is estimated to rise at 3% per year over the next three years

**Note 4-** Town operations & fees include Audit, phone, internet, postage, printing & Administrative costs. An additional \$15,000 was added for 2015-2016 and is carried through subsequent years to account for potential future legal expenditures. The insurance budget item was moved from the trustees to the town for fiscal 2015-2016 and is predicted to rise by 3% in 2018-2019 and beyond.

**Note 5-** Grants are not expected to be received, however we expect to receive Municipal Street Aid. These expenses will be 100 % offset by grant money and should not be an expense accounted for in land rent.

**Note 6-** The salaries of the secretary and treasurer in are held flat in 2018-2019 and beyond. Bookkeeping services are escalated by 3% per year.

**Note 7 -** Buzz Ware Village Center Operations are listed to increase 3% per year. These are total expenses from the Buzz and do not indicate the income off-set.

**Note 8 -** Arden non-discretionary commitment to the Buzz.

**Note 9-** Denotes that budget amounts are set by the budget committee based on previous budgets. Playground mulch was unknown at the time of budgeting and \$4000 estimate was used based on prior history.

**Note 10-** \$5,000 set aside for Buzz for support in case of an income shortfall.

**Note 11-** The Capital, Maintenance, & Repair Fund will be used for BWVC outside restoration. Item carried for 3 years until fund is replenished.

**Note 12-** Civic Committee expense for Roads, Commons & Snow Plowing are expected to rise at under 3% per year.

**Note 13-** The forest committee has forecasted \$8,000 per year due to ash borer treatment.

**Note 14-** Registration, Safety, & Donations will hold their present levels.

**Note 15-** Contingencies are forecasted at \$10,000 per year.

**Note 16 -** Offsetting income to the town that is used to offset specific budget line item expenses.

**Note 17** - Other income to the town that can be used to offset all budget expenses. It includes Cable, Antenna, and Interest.

**Note 18** - Income required to offset town expenses after “other income” is accounted for.

**Note 19** - Budget line items that are required in case a spend for those categories is necessary, but are not tied to a specific committee spend.

**Note 20** - Income needed to offset expected town expenses

**Note 21** - Approximate Trustee Cash reserve at the start of fiscal 2016-2017.

**Note 22** - Approximate Town Cash reserve at the start of fiscal 2016-2017.
