Call to Order: Steve called meeting to order at 7:30 p.m.

Approval of Minutes: January 27, 2021 minutes approved as presented.

Rick submitted an overview of snow removal costs through February 11th in the amount of \$2,700. Plus, December is \$1,800.

Estimate snow cost per event runs from \$1,000 to \$2,000 but this does not include an estimate for a “big snow” (defined as a dump of at least a foot). Prioritize after the snow season.

- Primary Discussion Issues:

- Snow Plowing and Salting

The main topic of discussion was plowing, salting plans and implementation for next year. Interested in researching alternatives to using rock salt. Calcium Magnesium Acetate (which the county uses) is effective, has less environmental impact, but is more expensive. Brining also has its positives and negatives.

Community feedback differs as to frequency of salting, plowing and under what conditions. Three inches has been the benchmark, but there are other factors that weigh into the decision as to when to plow and salt, which needs to be communicated to the town.

Rick and Brian Burslem are using Delaware Environmental Observing System website (www.deos.udel.edu), which tracks snowfall accumulations in the state by municipality in real time, to assist in their decision-making process. The last few snow falls, Brian used CMA, for which he charged the contractual price (rock salt \$40/bag, & CMA \$50/bag) because rock salt supply was problematic in obtaining. To address supply shortage, recommend that in advance of each season, purchase a pre-determined CMA quantity to store and have readily available. Check to see if Ardentown and Ardencroft would be interested in a joint purchase to take advantage of bulk economies of scale.

The snow contract term stipulates pay based on per bag basis. That means, for each bag, it also includes labor for distribution and no need to track time. Going forward, Rick suggests the committee purchase materials based on a better purchase price and just pay for labor. He points out it's not so much about the savings, as much as concern about supply, especially for a very bad winter.

Rick will check with Jeff about NCC possibly providing support to municipalities in terms of whether providing funds or alternative ice melt..

The Fire Lane access is blocked by the plowed snow. It's been the practice and don't think it is an issue.

The state plows a lot of snow right in front of the Oddporium (Marsh Rd & Sherwood Rd.). Since they pay a commercial rate for that space

and they are limited in their parking as is, Carol suggests asking Brian to sweep snow on side of Sherwood Rd., adjacent to Wayne's leasehold.

- White Pine on Village Green
 - Carol is meeting with Mike Klein on Friday and plans to go over the budget and obtain estimates for the spring work.
- Lower Lane
 - Near the stile there is a triple leader poplar tree that is dying; Carol believes it's just a matter of time. Estimated cost to remove is \$2,500 to \$3,000. The group officially gave Carol Larson permission to determine its fate and to take care of it.
- Follow-up on Identified Trees – Ron did a lot of clean up (leaning trees) around the back stop on Sherwood Green.
- Greens
 - Carol suggests the Greens need aerating so that the water can infiltrate more. An estimate is needed.
 - Sherwood Green parking area installed a grass seed mat a few years ago. The company contacted Al Marks as a follow up to inquire if we were still satisfied. Also, need to reseed in the spring.

 - Paths remove bike barriers after snow. Not a winter project.
